INDEPENDENT AUDITORS REPORT

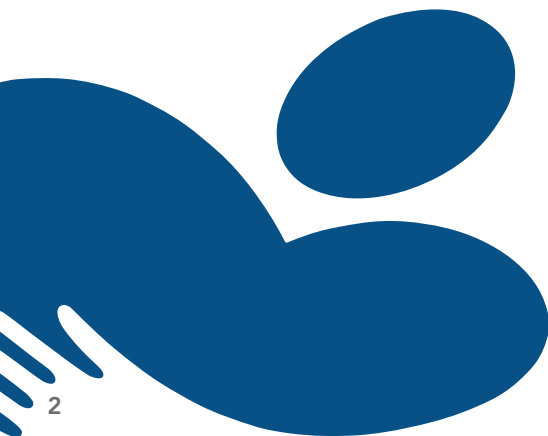
In addition to regular reviews and self-assessments, an independent audit is performed annually.

POLICY COUNCIL PURPOSE

The CASOMS Head Start Policy Council is a vital governance body responsible for ensuring that the program meets the needs of children and families through shared decision-making and oversight. CASOMS Policy Council provides parents with a voice in program planning, policies, and operations, fostering family engagement and community collaboration. It plays a crucial role in approving budgets, policies, and program plans, ensuring compliance with Head Start Performance Standards and federal regulations. The council is composed of eight (8) parent representatives and five (5) community leaders, ensuring a balanced representation of both enrolled families and external expertise.

COMPOSITION

Parent Representatives (8): Elected from each program site, with higher representation from Moss Point and Pascagoula due to larger enrollment. One representative advocates for the Early Head Start (EHS) program, representing parents and expectant families.

Community Leaders (5): Selected based on expertise in education, healthcare, social services, and child development. Current representatives include:

- A librarian, supporting early literacy initiatives
- A doctor, providing insight on child health and wellness
- Teachers, offering expertise in early childhood education
- Former Head Start parents, ensuring continued advocacy for families

This collaborative structure strengthens program decision-making, enhances services, and ensures community and parental input guide CASOMS Head Start's success.

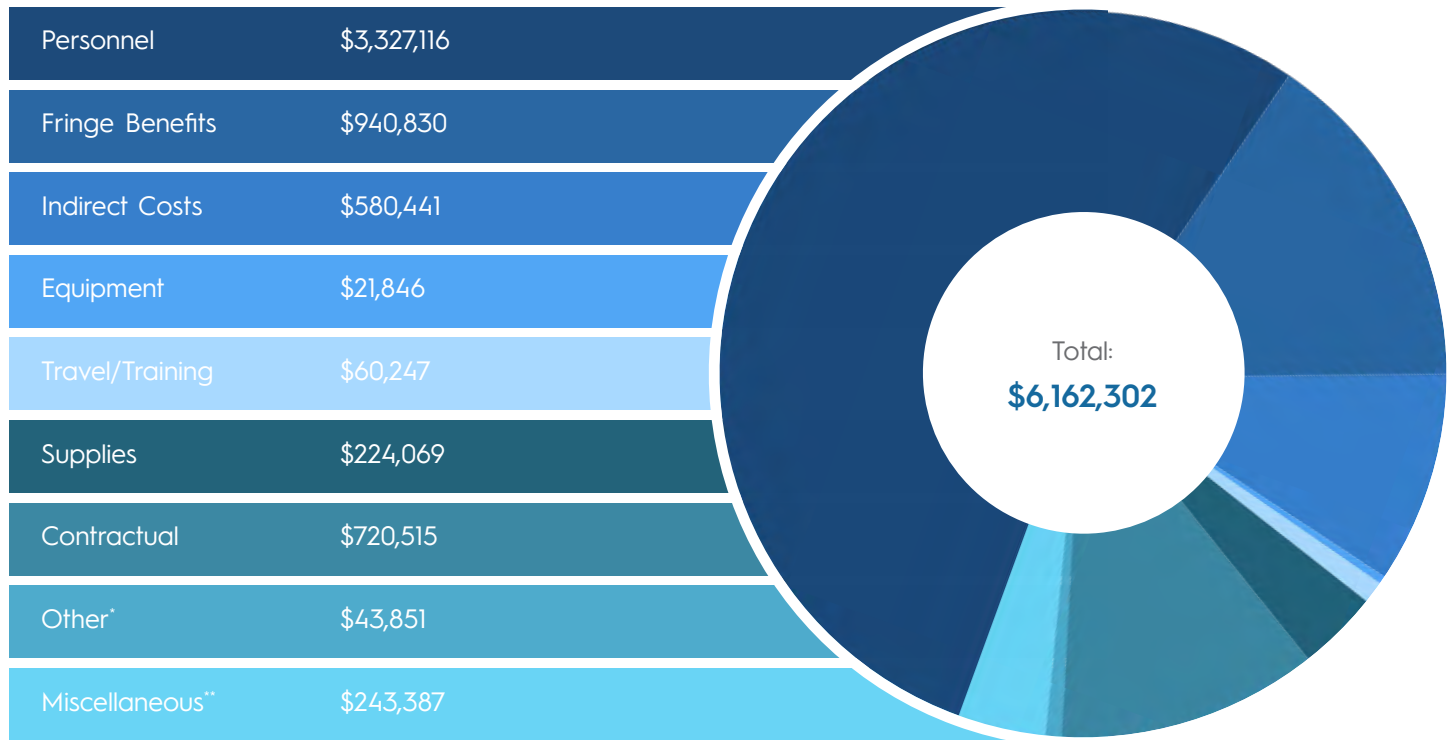

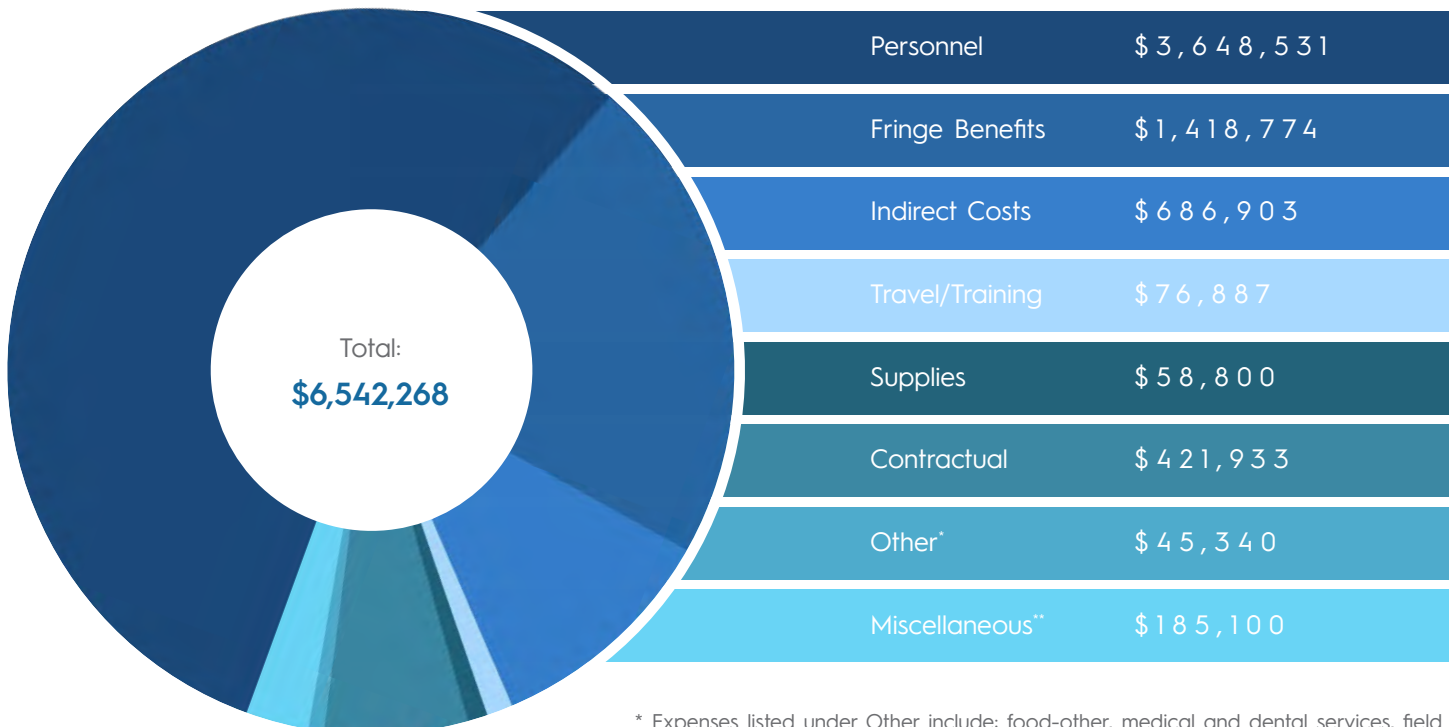
HEAD START BUDGET

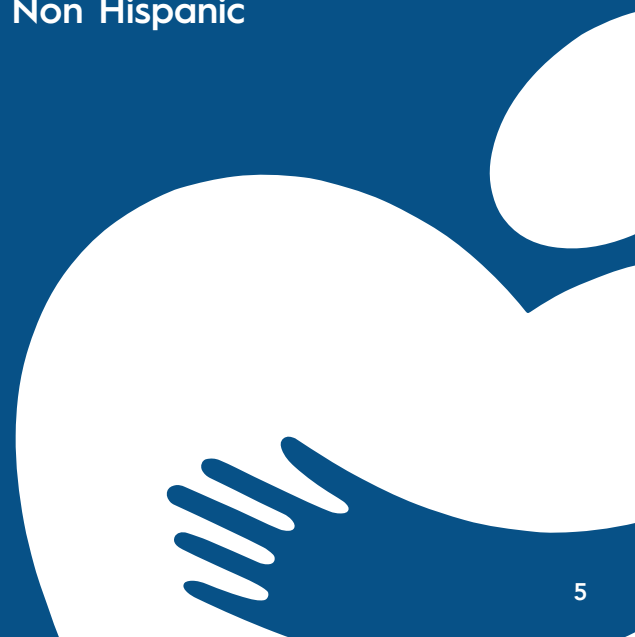

SCHOOL READINESS

To collect school readiness data our program used The Teaching Strategies GOLD online assessment instrument. The system measures the knowledge, skills, and behaviors that are most predictive of school success. The tool has 38 objectives, including 2 objectives related to English language acquisition. Thirty-six objectives are organized into nine areas of development and learning. The first four are major areas of child development: social-emotional, physical, language, and cognitive. The content learning that identified in early learning standards is organized into the following five areas: literacy, mathematics, science and technology, social studies, and the arts. The objectives in English language acquisition, help teachers follow a child’s progress in acquiring receptive and expressive skills in English.

Teachers used the Teaching Strategies GOLD assessment tool quarterly to collect the data needed to plan activities for individual children. Through the observations, children’s work samplings and parental input teachers leveled children in each objective area. At the end of each observation cycle and staff has finalized children’s checkpoints, Teaching Strategies GOLD reports are generated to show which children are meeting, exceeding or below an area of development and learning.

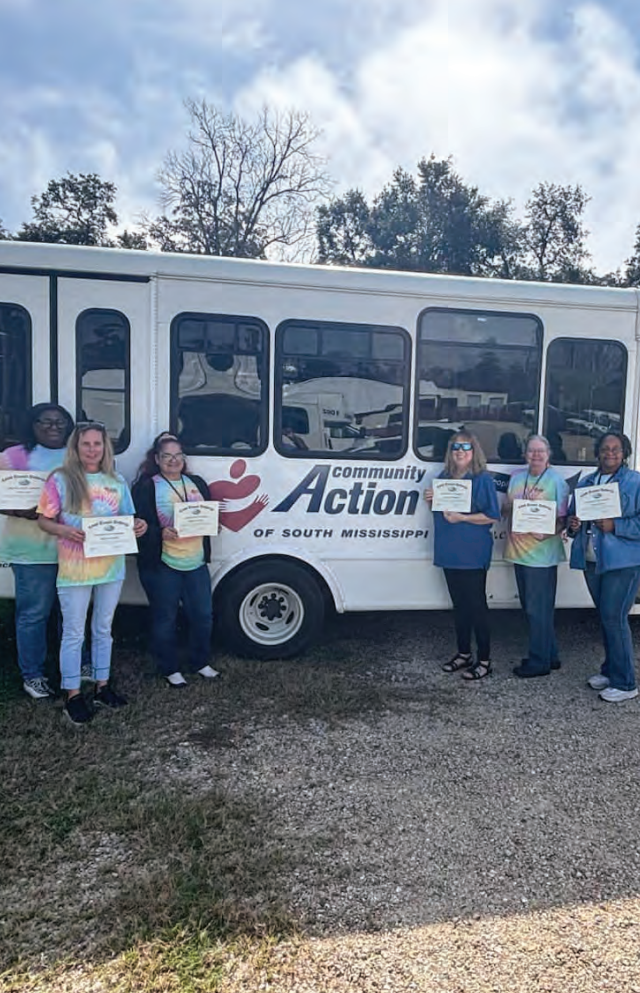

COMMUNITY SERVICE BLOCK GRANT (CSBG)

Community Action of South Mississippi engages in programming to assist clients become self-sufficient. CSBG clients are encouraged to participate with the case management program to assist with meeting their goals in the areas of Employment, Education, Income & Asset Building, Housing, Health & Social Behavior and Civic Engagement. Based on our annual community needs assessment we target efforts in areas that our identified by the community, for the community. Employment, Housing and education have been our top three priority issues this year.

PARENTING INITIATIVE

With grant funding from Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) CASOMS provides parenting classes for parents in Harrison and Jackson counties.

We use two curricula for the classes; Active Parenting and Within My Reach.

Active Parenting offers workshops for families with children 0-5 and 6 & up. These free classes are offered for parents during the day, weekends, and evenings as requested.

Through our pre/post testing and annual follow up we are pleased to share that 100% of families who participated in the Active Parenting classes report that they are still using the tools they learned from the instructor and Active Parenting curriculum materials.

The Within My Reach curriculum is designed to strengthen the adult partnership in order to allow parents to provide a health family environment for their children.

The Within My Reach curriculum provides adults with tools designed to strengthen their relationship skills. Research shows that when adults have strong, healthy relationships, children are given a better chance at growing up in a healthy, loving environment.

LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (LIHEAP)

Community Action of South Mississippi provides Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) services for George, Harrison and Jackson Counties in South Mississippi. LIHEAP provides federally funded assistance to reduce the costs associated with home energy bills, energy crises, weatherization and minor energy-related home repairs.

LIHEAP helps families stay warm in the winter and cool in the summer through programs that reduce the risk of health and safety problems that arise from unsafe heating and cooling situations and practices.

LIHEAP benefits target households with low incomes, particularly those that have a high home energy burden (percentage of income that goes to heating and cooling bills) and/or have members who are elderly, disabled, and/or have young children.

Families do not receive funds from the LIHEAP program; all funds are paid directly to the utility companies on behalf of the eligible family. LIHEAP funds are also used to ensure that Mississippi homes have adequate heat/air systems. As we all know living in Mississippi means an air conditioner is a must not a luxury. Community Action of South Mississippi partnered with vendors across the area to repair and in many cases replace air conditioning and heating systems to ensure families are able to remain safe in their home.

PARENT INVOLVEMENT ACTIVITIES

Community Action of South MS Head Start emphasizes parents' vital role in their child's development and success. We offer a variety of parent involvement activities to foster meaningful engagement, provide resources, and create opportunities for families to participate in their child's Head Start journey.

POLICY COUNCIL PARTICIPATION

Through the Policy Council, parents are encouraged to take an active role in program governance. As members, parents contribute to decision-making, policy development, and the overall direction of Head Start services. This opportunity empowers families to have a voice in their child's education and builds leadership skills.

MONTHLY PARENT ENGAGEMENT EVENTS

Each center organizes monthly events tailored to inform and engage families. These activities are often themed to align with community happenings or holidays:

- "Cruising the Coast" (October): Classic car owners showcase their vehicles for children to enjoy.
- Father Engagement Activities:
 - "Donuts with Dads": A morning event fostering connections between father figures and children.
 - "Dads on the Playground": An opportunity for active play and bonding.

PARENT CURRICULUM AND TRIPS

To further engage families, the program includes a Parent Curriculum designed to enhance parenting skills and support children's growth. Completion of the curriculum is a requirement for families to participate in the annual Parent Trip, an event to educate and celebrate their commitment and involvement.

Through these activities, parents and caregivers are informed, engaged and empowered to take an active role in their child's development and the program's success.

FOOD PANTRY

Food insecurity is a problem throughout our service area. Community Service Block Grant Funds are used to purchase food for our food pantries in George & Jackson Counties. Community Action of South Mississippi has operated a food pantry in Jackson County for many years through our partnership with Catholic Charities. Food baskets are distributed on Fridays or daily on an emergency basis as needed. The baskets include meat, fish, dairy, eggs, fresh fruits and vegetables and canned goods. The selection varies monthly but always provides high quality nutritious food for families in need.

CASOMS offers a food pantry in George County. This food pantry is due to the partnership of CASOMS, Sisters in Christ and Feeding America. CSBG funds are used to support the George County food pantry.

VOLUNTEER ASSISTANCE TAX PROGRAM (VITA)

The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) grant program is an IRS initiative designed to support free tax preparation service for the underserved through various partner organizations. This service helps low- to moderate-income individuals, persons with disabilities, the elderly, and limited English speakers file their taxes each year. The South MS VITA coalition is comprised of four agencies; Community Action of South MS, Mercy Housing & Human Development, and Keesler AFB. VITA is offered at 5 locations across the coast. The coalition has provided tax assistance for 19+ years to individuals who make under \$70,000 per year.
