Letter from the Executive Director

As I complete my first year as Executive Director, I have much for which to be thankful. First of all, thank you to the agency's dedicated Board of Directors for engaging with the management team and guiding us through it all. The name change from Jackson County Civic Action to Community Action of South Mississippi was met with enthusiasm by the community. We continued branding activities throughout the year and began work on a strategic plan to take us into the future. The agency continued to make positive gains toward recovery from the effects of the pandemic. Thanks to high vaccination rates among staff and clients, Head Start enrollment and Aging transportation increased significantly. Enrollment numbers for Early Head Start and Childcare remained high throughout the pandemic.

Although staff shortages continue to plague operations, teamwork and dedication to the greater good, buoyed staff, who wore multiple hats during this time. We hired a new Director of Children's Services and anticipate great things during her tenure. We remain optimistic that recruitment and retention efforts will yield positive results, stabilizing the agency workforce.

The agency was able to meet the needs of more clients than in previous years, due to the influx of additional federal funds during the pandemic. Those same funds allowed the agency to show appreciation to staff through retention incentives and increased pay. Other flexibilities offered by the agency's funders allowed for quality improvements to facilities, mental wellness for staff, and in-kind match waivers.

Our partners are integral to our success. We plan to rejuvenate existing partnerships while reaching out to new partners in the coming year. A huge thank you to the Jackson County Board of Supervisors and the Pascagoula Gautier School District for your continued support and partnership.

We were chosen, as an exemplary program, by the MS Dept of Economic Assistance, to host Dr. Lanique Howard, Director, Office of Community Services (OCS), Administration for Children and Families (ACF). As the OCS director, she provides leadership and oversight of over \$6 billion in mandatory and discretionary grants through seven social service and community development programs. The leadership team and I were able to spend one on one time with her to discuss our needs and concerns. She was able to visit with our seniors during their congregate meal. She encouraged us to apply for other funding opportunities through OCS. We assured her that the work we are entrusted with performing is being done well.

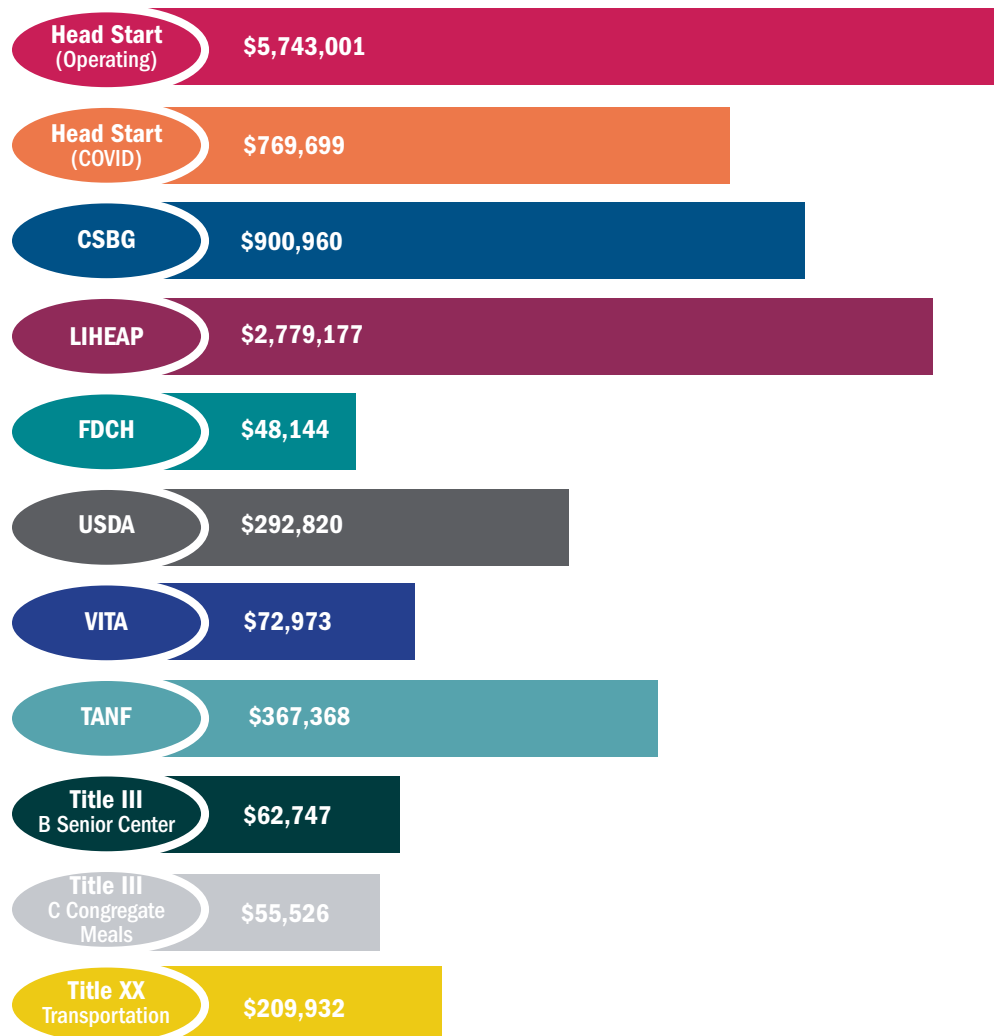

REVENUE FOR FY2022

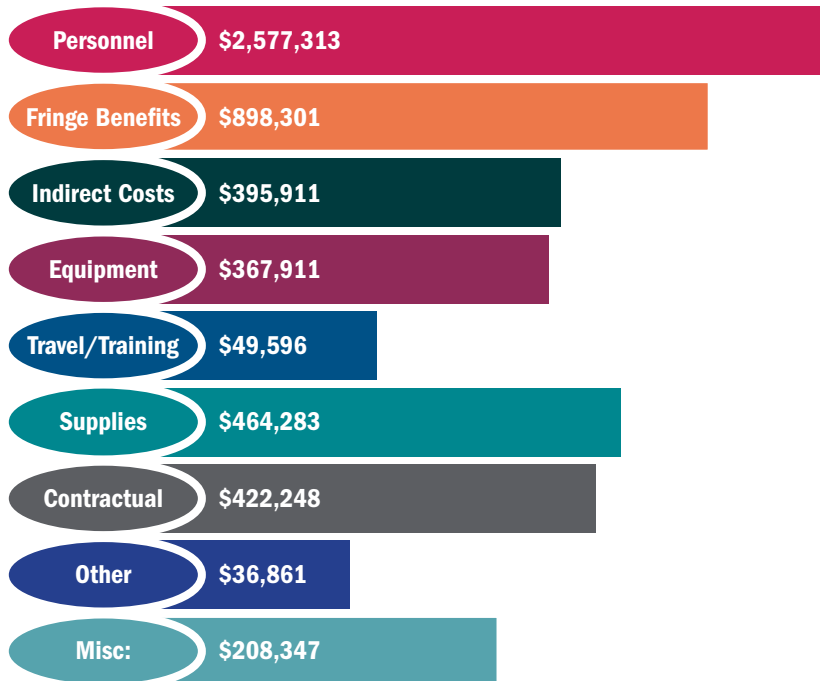


Head Start Budget

FISCAL YEAR 2021 (7/1/2021 - 4/30/2022)

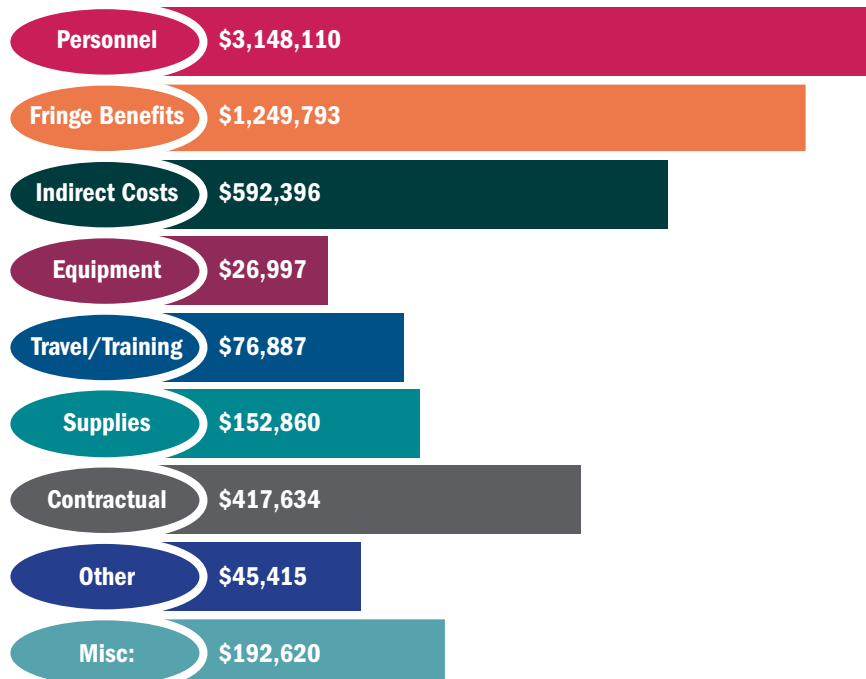
TOTAL = \$5,420,771

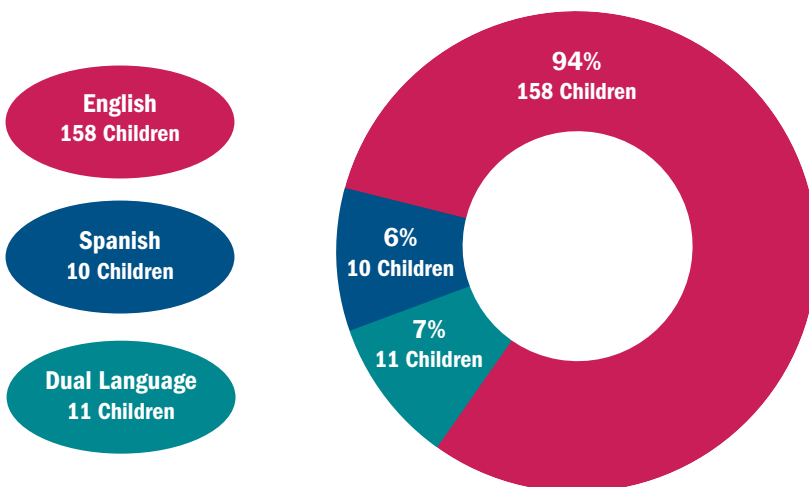
Head Start Primary Language

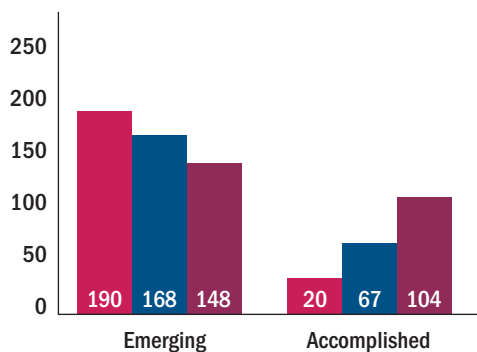
School Readiness

To collect school readiness data, the agency used The Teaching Strategies GOLD online assessment instrument. The system measures the knowledge, skills and behaviors that are most predictive of school success. The tool has 38 objectives, including 2 objectives related to English language acquisition. 36 objectives are organized into 9 areas of development and learning. The first 4 are major areas of child development; social/emotional, physical, language and cognitive. The content learning identified in early learning standards is organized into the following 5 areas; literacy, mathematics, science and technology, social studies and the arts. The objectives in English language acquisition help teachers follow a child's progress in acquiring receptive and expressive skills in English.

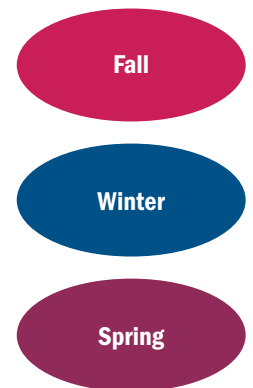
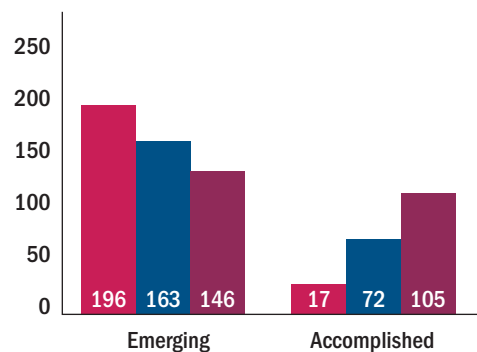
Teachers used the Teaching Strategies GOLD assessment tool quarterly to collect the data needed to plan activities for individual children. Through observations of children's work samplings and parental input, teachers leveled children in each objective area. At the end of each observation cycle, teachers finalized children's checkpoints. Teaching Strategies GOLD reports are generated to show which children are meeting, exceeding or below an area of development and learning.

Community Action of South Mississippi Community Service Block Grant (CSBG)

Community Action of South Mississippi engages in programming to assist clients with meeting their goals in the areas of Employment, Education, Income & Asset Building, Housing, Health & Social Behavior and Civic Engagement. Based on our annual community needs assessment we target efforts in areas that are identified by the community, for the community. Employment, Education, and Housing have been serious issues this year.

Volunteer Assistance Tax Program (VITA)

The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) grant program is an IRS initiative designed to support free tax preparation service for the underserved through various partner organizations. This service helps low- to moderate-income individuals, persons with disabilities, the elderly, and limited English speakers file their taxes each year. The agency has provided tax assistance for 16+ years to individuals who make under \$60,000 per year.

Child and Adult Care Food Programs (CACFP)

CASOMS contracts with the MS Department of Education to provide breakfast, lunch and snacks to children enrolled in Head Start, Early Head Start and First Step Childcare. The CACFP serves nutritious meals and snacks to eligible children who are enrolled for care at participating childcare centers. CACFP also provides meals and snacks to children and youth who participate in afterschool care programs or reside in emergency shelters.

Family Day Care Homes (FDCH)

CASOMS operates the Family Day Care Homes (FDCH) program in George, Harrison, Jackson, Perry and Stone Counties. FDCH provides reimbursements for meals and snacks that meet the requirements set forth by USDA. These are private homes where children under 13 receive care. The homes are licensed, registered/inspected or approved for the program. The reimbursements make the cost of day care more affordable for many lower income families. Health and safety standards, training and monitoring are also very important components in the FDCH program.

There are two types of FDCH:

- Licensed homes that care for 6-15 children
- Alternate approved homes that care for 5 children or less

Summer Food Service Program (SFSP)

Due to severe staff shortages, CASOMS was unable to operate the SFSP program during the summer of 2022.

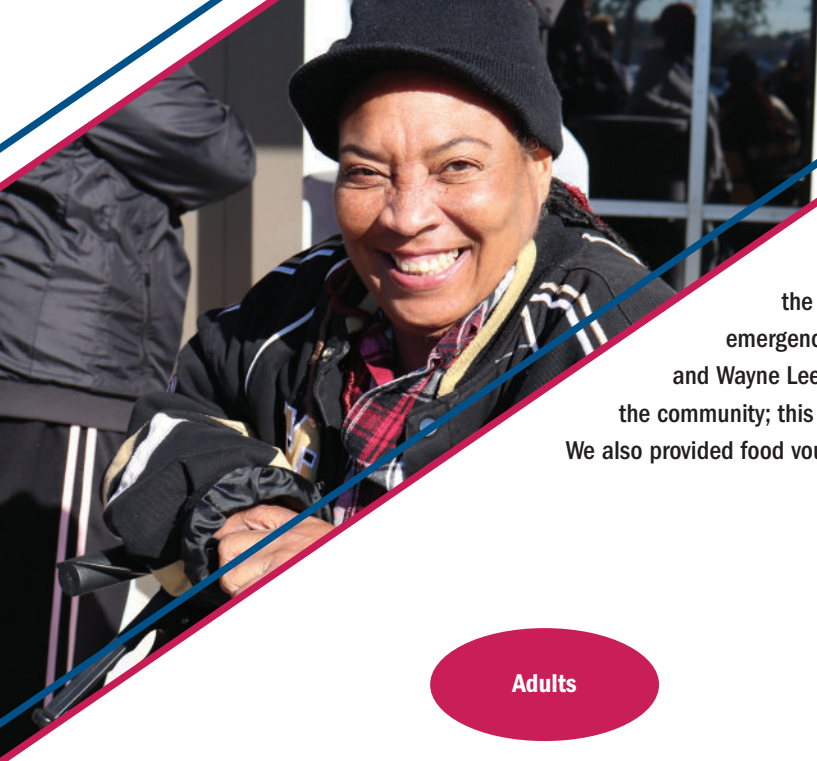

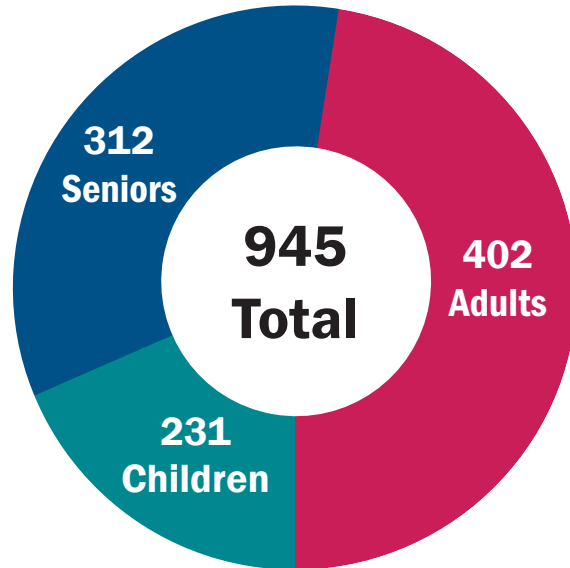
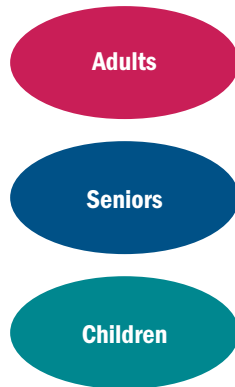

Food Pantry

Food insecurity is a problem throughout our service area. Community Action of South Mississippi operates a food pantry for the local community. Food baskets are distributed on Fridays or on an emergency basis as needed. This year, CASOMS partnered with Aetna/CVS and Wayne Lees to provide Thanksgiving Baskets for seniors and those in need in the community; this partnership allowed us to provide 65 baskets in Jackson County. We also provided food vouchers for families in Harrison and George counties.



Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP)

The Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) received \$13 million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to help income-eligible residents maintain access to drinking water and wastewater services through the end of September 2023. This important resource provides financial assistance to eligible households in managing costs associated with:

- Water bills
- Wastewater/sewer bills
- Stormwater fees
- Groundwater fees
- Reconnection fees
- Late fees

LIHWAP is available for individuals and families who need assistance paying a current bill, have past-due water bills, had their service terminated, or received a notice indicating that their service will be terminated in the next 60 days. Households can receive the LIHWAP grants for both drinking water and wastewater services. The funding is issued directly to the utility providers to support families who meet income requirements.

Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)

Due to passage of the American Rescue Plan, Mississippi received a record \$66.9 million for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) October 2021 to September 2022. As part of a state-by-state breakdown of funding, the Administration reported that in addition to an annual appropriation of \$33.2 million for Mississippi, the state received an additional \$33.8 million in funds from the American Rescue Plan—more than double the state's typical annual funding. The total of \$66.9 million is the highest amount Mississippi has ever received in LIHEAP to help families struggling with the costs of home heating.

Parenting Initiative

With grant funding from Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) CASOMS has provided parenting classes for parents in Harrison and Jackson counties. Classes began in February 2022. We use two curricula for the classes—Active Parenting and Within My Reach. Active Parenting offers workshops for families with children 0-5 and 6 & up. These free classes are offered for parents during the day, weekends, and evenings as requested. The Within My Reach curriculum is designed to strengthen the adult partnership in order to allow parents to provide a health family environment for their children.

CASOMS provided Active Parenting classes for 339 parents February – October 2022.

CASOMS began Within my Reach workshops in September 2022. We provided workshops for 19 parents during that time.

The TANF Parenting Initiative will continue for FY23.

Healthy bodies, alert minds, energized spirits—that is what Community Action of South Mississippi Seniors Program for adults age 60+ is all about. CASOMS Seniors Program is year-round and offers diverse activities to support independence and enhance quality of life. We remain flexible and determined to rebuild our aging program. As the pandemic continued, we saw significant drops in attendance at our senior centers. We have also experienced staffing issues that have impacted our transportation department. We are hopeful that 2023 will bring us closer to our pre-COVID numbers in attendance, transportation and meals.

The senior centers are focal points in the community where persons, individually or as a group, come together for a broad spectrum of services, educational and recreational programs and activities. These facilities enable individuals 60 years of age and older to socialize, develop skills, engage in activities, learn new roles that enhance their dignity, support their independence and encourage their involvement within the community.

Services offered include transportation, congregate meals, and a variety of activities geared toward adults 60+.
